

General regulations according to Infection-Protected Pig Farm "Advanced"

The farm's infection control regulations for visitors

All visitors must be informed about the farm's infection control regulations. The infection control regulations must be drawn up together with a livestock vet or an animal health vet. The regulations must be in writing.

- 1. The boundary between outer and inner areas must be respected. Clothing and footwear must be changed at the boundary. External clothing and footwear must not come in contact with clothing and footwear belonging to the farm.
- 2. Use clean protective clothing and footwear/boots provided by the farm.
- 3. Hands must be washed with soap and water and then treated with disinfectant before and after contact with the livestock.
- 4. As far as possible, the farm's own tools, instruments and other equipment must be used. If this is not possible, equipment must be washed and disinfected as well as possible before being used for the livestock.
- 5. The waiting period after a visit to farms abroad or after other contact with foreign cloven-footed animals (e.g. markets, hunts) is 48 hours. After a visit to areas with foot and mouth disease, the waiting period is 5 days.
- 6. Visitors from abroad must complete a Visitor's Certificate.
- 7. After you have read through the regulations, you must sign the visitors' journal. You must also state your most recent visit to another pig farm, the type of farm and its location.

The farm's infection control regulations for staff

All staff must be informed about the farm's infection control regulations. The infection control regulations must be drawn up together with a livestock vet or an animal health vet. The regulations must be in writing.

- 1. There must be stop signs on all doors and the main entrance. The boundary by the main entrance must be clearly marked. The telephone number to the livestock manager/person in charge must be stated on the signs.
- 2. The boundary between outer and inner areas must be respected. Clothing and footwear must be changed at the boundary. External clothing and footwear must not come in contact with clothing and footwear belonging to the farm.

- 3. Use clean protective clothing and footwear/boots provided by the farm.
- 4. Hands must be washed with soap and water and then treated with disinfectant before and after contact with the livestock.
- 5. The waiting period after a visit to farms abroad or after contact with foreign cloven-footed animals (e.g. markets, hunts) applies to staff as well and is 48 hours. After a visit to areas with foot and mouth disease, the waiting period is 5 days.
- 6. Ensure that all visitors are informed about the farm's infection control regulations and sign the visitors' journal.
- 7. It is your responsibility to find out where the visitor has been before visiting the farm.
- 8. Tradesmen, craftsmen etc. must use the farm's own tools, instruments and other equipment as far as possible. If this is not possible, equipment must be washed and disinfected as well as possible before being used.

Other requirements/recommendations external to the programme:

- It is forbidden to feed the pigs with food waste.
- Vehicles that have been to farms abroad must be washed in an automatic car wash including flushing the undercarriage before visiting Swedish farms.
- Do not work with the pigs if you have diarrhoea and a temperature at the same time.
- Use plasters and gloves if you have any sores or eczema on your hands.
- Use gloves when in contact with body fluids (e.g. in conjunction with castrations).
- Remove rings, watches etc. and if you have your mobile phone with you, disinfect it before and after contact with the livestock.

Specific regulations for this farm:
